FROM THE PRESIDENT

Our New Secretary

He also chairs Unions Wellington and is a Council member of Weltec.

"My vision for the future is one of growth for the Association especially with the guys who attended the two colleges during the 1980s and 1990s. This era is currently under represented in our membership but is the most critical because these are the people who will take the Association into the future. I look forward to meeting them all and getting them on board."

STREAM

At the Mass celebrating the Feast of the Assumption six students were baptised and received the Blessed Eucharist, and a further four received their first Eucharist. The celebrant for the occasion was Fr Kevin Murphy SM. Mass began with a "thunderous" haka performed by the College Kapa Haka group to honour Mary, and prior to the readings the Polynesian group brought the Bible to the lectern, accompanied by song. In his homily Fr Kevin highlighted that Mary is our Mother and our role model as Marists. She said "Yes" to God and we are invited to do the same.

In these times when the number of active priests is declining the Colleges are blessed to have chaplains. As a measure of the demand for chaplains' services Fr Kevin also assists Marist colleges in Tasmania.

In early June the games between the 1st XV's and 1st X1's of Stream and Wellington College were played at Stream with the hosts winning the rugby 11-3 and drawing the soccer 1-1. Rugby with Wellington College has been played 77 times since 1931 with Stream ahead by 42-28 with 7 games drawn. Old Boys and Hurricanes players Thomas and Scott Waldrom and Tim Fairbrother spoke to the Stream teams before the games.

Enrolment scheme

The Rector, Mr Philip Mahoney has supplied the following information about the scheme which has prompted letters to the Association and discussion among Old Boys of both the Colleges.

In years gone by, places at Silverstream went mainly to boarders, then to Hutt Valley day boys. Integration of the College in the 80s didn't change that pattern. It does mean that we are funded in the same way as a state school of equal size for salaries and running costs. However, under the present government, when integrated schools find they have more applicants than they can accept, they are required under a section of the Education Act to put enrolment schemes in place. Silverstream has had such a scheme since 2007. Although the Board of Trustees was able to guarantee priority to boarders, and to local students, siblings and then the wider Hutt Valley, the Ministry will not approve schemes that create a priority group for sons and grandsons of Old Boys.

The Minister of Education has recently agreed to raise the maximum roll of the College from 680 to 720 from 2009. This relieves some of the pressure on places at Year 9. It ensures that younger brothers of current or past students living out of the local zone should gain entry. It also opens up places for students from out of zone whose fathers attended the College. Any remaining places will be allocated by ballot as outlined in the enrolment scheme.

Check the scheme which is on the website www.stream.school.nz. The college is now unable to accept pre-enrolments, since the scheme can be reviewed and changed from one year to another by the Board. Applications should be made when the boy is in Year 8, the year before he starts secondary.

The good news is that boarders are priority one under the scheme, so that the boarding tradition at Stream will remain. After years of declining numbers from the 80s, the boarding roll is growing and should pass 100 in 2009. As former dormitories have been converted into classroom and administration areas, the Board of Proprietors is planning to upgrade current boarding facilities and considering building a modern facility for senior boarders. Former boarders will be pleased to know that at Stream, the boarding school is also implementing the new healthy food in schools requirements from June 1. Boarders these days have menu choices (healthy ones), morning tea, and supper. Mobile phones mean texting is the normal form of communication with home – several times a day! The camaraderie that exists between boarders, both while here and when they leave still remains.

The Board of Proprietors are responsible not only for the boarding school, but the rest of the extensive property at Stream and the Special Character of the College. If any Catholic Old Boy is interested in serving as a Trustee, please contact the Rector. If you have a finance, property, legal or marketing background, the Board will like to hear from you.

OLD BOY NEWS

Noel Johnston (S40) has moved from his farm into Hawera. He has a distinguished reputation in community, farming and sporting organisations in Taranaki and his roles include Mayor of the Hawera District, Regional Councillor and Justice of the Peace. He has also acted as a Commissioner under various Acts. He has finished writing a book about a distinguished ancestor and is now authoring another.

On his return from overseas service in Italy in 1943, **Trevor Powell** (S36-7), resumed farming outside Hawera. He still lives on the farm which is now run by a son. Trevor spends many hours each week, as he has for many years, as organist at St Joseph's Church, Hawera, and his services are in demand for Masses, Requiems and weddings. For his services he received a Papal Medal in 2000. His arrangements for Psalms at Masses are used in many Catholic churches. For recreation Trevor is a regular and keen golfer.

Bob Green (T43-5) farmed for many years and has now retired into Hawera. His horticultural skills are in demand and the gardens around St Joseph's church have benefited from his expertise. Bob is an expert rifle shooter, receiving regular mention in newspaper results, and has competed overseas.

Nicholas Twohill (T67-71) has been awarded a Ph.D in History by the University of Auckland. His thesis is entitled *The Missing Shore: New Zealand and Spanish American Interactions 1820-1914*. In a note Nicholas writes "New Zealand's engagement with Spanish-speaking America was a forgotten aspect in NZ history, and my work sets out to fill this gap in NZ historiography".

The *Sunday Star Times* included in its "100 Business Luminaries who have shaped our nation" Sir **Patrick Ledger Goodman** (S46-8) PCNZM, CBE. The citation reads "... turned his family business in Motueka into a major trans-Tasman food company that still carries the Goodman name. He became founding chairman of Quality Bakers New Zealand, which merged with Fielder Gillespie Davis and Allied Mills of Australia and Wattie Industries to become Goodman Fielder Wattie in 1987. Goodman was appointed a special trade ambassador for New Zealand in 1990 and was on the New Zealand Trade Development Board and the Kiwifruit Marketing Board.

Awapuni trainer **Mark Oulaghan** (S70-3) has long been a dominant force at Grand National

meetings. His charges include Yourtheman, Crossword, Shamrock Star, Jowka and Boycott. Winners at Riccarton were Shamrock Star (Winter Cup), Yourtheman (Sydenham Hurdles) and The Jolly Dancer (Koral Steeplechase). Mark had previously won the Winter Cup with Amore Mia in 1996, and Jolly Rodger in 2000. He won the Grand National Steeplechase twice with Deecee Seven and the Grand National Hurdles three times, with Rand, Yourtheman and Counterpunch.

Sir **Michael Fay** (S62-6) features in *National Business Review's Rich List 2007*, as does the Goodman family. **Greg Goodman** (76-80) is CEO of property investment business Goodman International, **Craig** (S80-4) is London based, and **Patrick** (S68-9) is MD of the family's investment vehicle. The Todd family also features under the direction of **John Todd** (S1944).

The headline in the *DomPost* read 'Kiwi at the helm of Harrod's – He may just be the most successful businessman you've never heard of – and he's running a British institution'.

James McArthur (T72: S73-6) was born in France while his father was posted there as a diplomat. He lived in New Zealand between ages three to five, and from 10 to 25. After graduating from Victoria Uni with first-class honours and working as a Reserve Bank economist, he completed MBA at Harvard in 1987 then became an investment banker in London, where he first began advising Gucci. In 1999 he brought his wife and children back to NZ to settle in Hawkes Bay, where Gucci headhunted him. He spent 12 years at Gucci Group as executive vice-president and as president of the Yves St Laurent brand, the *Financial Times* describing him as "one of fashion's most prolific corporate personalities".

James McArthur is Harrods' Group CEO, a position created especially for him, reporting directly to Chairman Mohamed Al Fayed. He oversees the Knightsbridge store as well as the group's real estate, aviation and airport terminal retail operations.

Grant Roa (T64-9) has been quiet since his roles in Whale Rider and Secondhand Wedding but local and media report him as working in the cast of short film Kehua.

Rain of the Children the latest feature of **Vincent Ward** (S69-71) has won the Grand Prix at a film festival in Poland. One of Europe's biggest film events 260 films are shown and the prize is decided by audience vote.

SPORT

Marist St Pats won the Swindale Shield for the first time in eight seasons, and drew 10-10 with Norths in the final of the Jubilee Cup. In pre-season games MSP won the Ham Cumming

Cup at the Spillane tournament in Auckland in March, defeating Auckland Marist 32-7, and will be promoted to the top division for Spillane 2009.

MARIST NEWS

The new Provincial, Fr **Brian Cummings** (T67-71) has taken over the reins from Fr **Denis O'Hagan** (T69-73). He is fulltime at Cerdon, the Provincial Centre and lives at the Provincial House in Kelburn.

The Vicar Provincial is Fr **Philip Cody** (T58-62), the Assistant Provincial, Fr Tim Duckworth, and the Councillors Frs **Peter Roe** (S66-7), Mervyn Duffy and **Pat Brophy** (S72-6).

Father John Walls has departed for Marist College, Atlanta, USA where he is responsible for Marist leadership. His successor as Superior of Marist Centre, 88 Hobson Street Wellington is Father Peter Conaghan, previously located in Feilding. Father Walls was also National Police Chaplain and Fr Peter Head has now been appointed to this position. Three Marists have died since the March *Patsman*: Fr **Gus Hill** (T30), Fr **Fred Crombie** (T31) and Fr **Gerry Mills** (S44-7) and their service is recorded under Obituaries.

VISITING ALZHEIMERS

It's human nature that we tend to get nervous when we come face to face with something unfamiliar or something we're a little afraid of. For most of us Alzheimers is just that. Small wonder that we may hesitate to visit, and feel very awkward talking to a family member, a friend or a fellow Old Boy who has Alzheimers. What should he expect from that person? What should we do? What should we say or not say.

At the after Sunday Mass cup of tea, you bump into a friend you know has Alzheimers and is living in care. Now, he's sitting by himself, finishing his cuppa.

"This seat taken?" you ask gesturing to the empty one across the table.

"Good morning" he answers, "Long time no see. Pull up a chair."

"Isn't it a beautiful day" you ask, sitting down.

"Beautiful", he answers and smiles.

Suddenly he looks around. "Where's Joan?" he asks you and you realise he's referring to his wife who died a couple of years ago. "Where's Joan?" he demands.

A person with Alzheimers can appear to have strong social skills. He may be pleasant and smile and visit, but then without warning the conversation may skew off at a wild angle. What can you do if that happens?

First, don't panic. Your getting upset will only fuel his anxiety. Reassure him that things are all right. Use a calm voice.

Second, don't argue over what he has said. It will do no good trying to convince him he is wrong. On the other hand, don't lie. The fine line you must walk is to offer replies that are non-committal ("Hmmm...oh?") as you gently steer the conversation in another direction. ("I don't see Joan" would be one way of telling him you understand what he has said, but then you can redirect the conversation. "You know speaking about the game last Saturday, I just love rugby. I remember the first Test I saw. It was ...").

And third, if the person is so upset he's got to the point of pacing, don't try to stop him physically. Rather, begin to pace alongside him, then gradually slow your rate. He will probably slow to match yours. Let's go back to the cup of tea. Most likely your friend has a caregiver or relative nearby who will have suggestions for dealing specifically with your friend. Though they may be too tired to say it, they're probably extremely grateful that you have stepped forward and visited with him.

Too often we let an initial fear get in the way of our acts of charity and fraternity when it concerns a friend or family member, with Alzheimers. "I don't want to say or do the wrong thing", becomes a handy excuse for not saying or doing anything.

But what are the right things to say or do? Here are some suggestions:

Be respectful – This seems obvious but sometimes the obvious is overlooked.

Don't test the person – You're not there to probe a mind and find out what he is, or isn't capable of remembering. ("Hi! Do you know my name?")

Keep your sentences simple – Ask one specific question at a time. Not "What do you want on

your score?" or "Do you want jam or would you like honey?". But "Do you want jam on your score?" Yes or no. "Do you want honey on your score?" Yes or no.

Include important information – "Is your daughter Marie here today?" is better than "Where is your daughter? Is Marie here?"

If the person is having difficulty coming up with a specific word, don't try to fill in the blank. Every time you guess, it only confuses him more. It is better, but harder, to give the person time to come up with the word. If he can't, don't dwell on it.

Probably the only way to become comfortable visiting someone with Alzheimers is to spend time with them.

Human nature being what it is, as we become familiar with something and as we learn more about it we tend to be less afraid. Our fears seem unfounded, a little foolish and a poor excuse for not doing what we know is right.

There are Old Boys or their wives with advanced or incipient Alzheimers. Shared past happy events can create a talking point and ease the burden of trying to maintain a flow of conversation.

At the Requiem Mass for **Paul Finnigan** (Obits Sept 07) his brother **Carl** (S75-9) "delivered an irreverent but fitting eulogy covering Paul's younger life" and was followed by lifelong friend **Paul McHugh** (S74-8).

'Paul Finnigan died in Christchurch on 18 September 07. During his illness he was attended with devotion by Fr Carl Telford SM. He had a great marriage to Joan and with her brought up two fine sons, Liam and Alex (present students at St Bede's).

Never far away were Paul's many younger brothers and sisters. Together with their own families they enjoyed the love and support of Paul over the years. Paul was warm, kind and generous. He was a great communicator. He liked to make people laugh and he enjoyed being made to laugh.

Paul was born in Masterton and following his years at Stream and a short stint at Mt St Mary's, completed a B.Sc degree at Massey and then headed off on his OE.

Upon returning to New Zealand, he commenced the study of law whilst working for the Public Trust in Wellington (where he met Jan). He moved to Christchurch to work for Trustees Executors. It was here he was admitted to the bar in 1990. His practice of law saw him becoming partner in Ashburton law firm Argyle, Welsh and Finnigan.

Paul had a keen community interest and was a member of many organisations including the Mid-Canterbury Rugby Union. His love of fitness saw him compete in five coast to coast events along with numerous other endurance style events, often in the company of other family members.'

At the time of his death, Paul had already influenced the lives of more people than most of us ever will. He was always giving of his time and his energy to his large extended family, his wide circle of friends and his many business associates. In no small way this was evidenced at the Church of the Holy Name in Ashburton where hundreds of mourners paid tribute to his exceptional life.'

The Requiem Mass was concelebrated by Frs Mark Walls SM and John Craddock SM. Paul's five sisters and his brothers **Riki** (S76-8), **Bart** (S77-81) and **Blake** (S80-4) were present as were **Paul Hocquard** (S72-6) and Judges **Pat Mahony** (S50-3) and **Greg Hikaka** (S72-6).

Father **Gus Hill** (T27-30) was ordained in December 1937, then spent his active priestly years in the Colleges – St Bede's (38-40 and 78-93), St John's (41-4 then 46-52). He retired to Marist Centre, Wellington and Marian House, Silverstream, where he died.

After ordination in December 1941, Fr **Fred Crombie** was appointed to St Bede's (52-55 and 75-8), then Rector of St Patrick's High School Timaru (56-64), and staff of St John's College (65-74). One year was spent at St Mary of the Angels (79) and as Editor of the Marist Messenger (79-82), Superior of the Seminary Extension Wellington (80-1), Bursar SPC (82-4), St Mary of the Angels (85-94) and 02-03), Sacred Heart Timaru (95-2001). He

retired at Armstrong village Christchurch, where he died.

Fr **Gerry Mills** (S44-7) was ordained in December 1954 and his first appointment was to St John's College (55). He served at SPC (56-63) and later as Rector (71-6), Silverstream (64-70 and 77), before appointment to St Bede's 78-90, the last three years as Rector. This completed his work in the Colleges. His later appointments were as Tertiary Chaplain, Palmerston North (90-3), Sacred Heart Parish Hastings (94), St Mary of the Angels (94-9) and St Francis Xavier, Whangarei (2000-2006). He retired to the Wellington Community earlier this year, where he died.

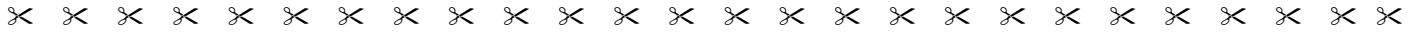
